






I'm so thankful for our feelings of closeness... of personal regard and respect.









Next the retiring King









Creativity In Action

Both art and shop encourage students to use their creative side. Art involves a way of seeing and thinking about spatial relationships, color, balance, symmetry, and proportion. It teaches students to use their creativity by developing projects such as airbrush, stained glass, mural painting, silk screening, clay, mirror etching, and t-shirt painting. According to the art teacher, Mrs. Camby, the class provides a hands-on type of skill
















