


### THE TOWN



What IS school publications class? According to Webster, a publication is "that which has been published". Therefore, a school publication would be that which a school publishes. Mike Hill explained the class to be "a class where students inform the school of what is happening through the LION'S GAZETTE and the EL LEON".

To be more specific, the class is "where I can learn how to write properly and get experience" to Cindy Lynch, who is planning a journalism career. It's fun, agree most of the students involved in the class, but there is also a lot of work. "A blast after you get your newspaper articles in, but a pain before you do", says Randy Rains. "Typing like mad" remembers Jennifer Johnson, and co-editor Becky Blankenship recalls "trying to fit a large article into a short column". Mrs. Arnall sums it up with "It's my favorite class because I can see the results of what I do. A lot of fun, but a lot of hard work."

School Publications isn't just writing. It's brainstorming for new article topics, it's researching, it's interviewing, it's trying to be creative when your subject matter is dreary. For the EL LEON staff, there are deadlines to meet, ENDLESS pages of copy to write, and many decisions to be made.

Through it all, each student has contributed much to the class. Every student writes at least one article for each edition of the paper, so that 8 or more articles are put out a year. Then all available typists use their skill in transforming illegible scrawls to neat paragraphs. The layout personnel arrange these articles along with the advertisements, which business managers provide, into what is the paper.

The yearbook works much the same, only the writing is done by mainly the copy editor. There are people who do picture captions and those who put the right names with the right (and sometimes wrong) people in the class sections. Layout people arrange the whole thing into the final product.




Red and white silk roses in white vases decorated the tables, and each girl was presented a silk rose in honor of her presence at the prom.

## LANGUAGE ARTS







The high school also offers a course in business math, taught by Mrs. Wilson; and general math, taught by Mr. Haden.







The student desiring to go into a vocational course of study has no problem at M.H.S. There is an abundance of vocational classes, but if the student wishes more, he has the opportunity to enroll in the Vo-Tech classes at Mtn. Grove.

Here at Mansfield, the vocational classes fall in four main categories - industrial

arts, business, agriculture, and home economics.

Mr. Ghan, the industrial arts teacher whose favorite words include "go to work, sand more, and clean up," teaches the following courses: general shop, general

metals, woodworking, drafting, and eighth grade shop.

Business courses offered include typing, shorthand, accounting, and secretarial-clerical office practice. These courses are taught by Miss Stanton, who tells the following story. "The 1978-79 beginning shorthand class wanted to break a world record in shorthand. Therefore, I tried to get the class up to 140 words per minute. But no one was able to accomplish this feat. So then I crammed all ten students into the furnace closet in the shorthand room, and as years pass, they will be able to look back and say that they actually broke a world record in shorthand."

Mr. Cravens teaches Agriculture I and II, advanced diary production, advanced livestock, electricity and welding, and agricultural construction. Mr. Cravens especially enjoys Ag. I because the "greenhands are getting their first exposure to FFA and vocational agriculture. I can watch them develop leadership and grow in

knowledge."

Mrs. Barnett teaches Home Economics I, contemporary living, eighth grade home ec., child development, tailoring, housing, and consumer education. She sees an advantage to her courses in that "the kids choose to take them. They don't have to enroll in home economics if they aren't interested."








### COUNSELING


Mrs. Haden is also responsible for registering students, and testing them according to state policies. She sponsors the National Honor Society.





# MRS. WOOD, WE WON'T FORGET

Although Mrs. Dorothy Wood is no longer standing at the blackboard in her classroom, lecturing to a number of high school students, she will always remain in their hearts. For Mrs. Wood was no ordinary teacher or person. She was much more. She was warm, understanding, and always took a special interest in every student she had.

There was never a problem too big or too small when a student needed Mrs. Wood's help. She devoted her life to her work and after taking one of her classes you could walk away with the

satisfaction of knowing you had learned something.

Former graduates of Mansfield who came back to visit the high school nearly always took time to speak to Mrs. Wood while there. Even though she worked them hard while they were in school, it was Mrs. Wood they remembered after graduating.

In the classroom, she demanded respect and attention and she got it. Where other teachers may have failed to impress upon students the importance of a sound education, Mrs. Wood usually managed to succeed. Her ready smile and sense of humor gave her a special kind of personality which attracted friendship from everyone she knew.

Dorothy Alice Barlow was born April 11, 1926 on the same farm where she was living at the time of her death on November 9, 1978.

She spent nearly all of her school years here in Mansfield, but attended school in the state of Oregon for a short period of time. She returned to Mansfield in the middle 1930's and graduated from high school in 1943.

Mrs. Wood began teaching at the age of seventeen at Robinette near Hartville and at Oak Ridge near Mansfield. She attended college at Southwest Missouri State Teachers College in Springfield while teaching.

In the spring of 1948, Mrs. Wood graduated from college with a B.S. in Education. In March of the same year she married Mr. Robert Wood. Her next teaching jobs were at Dora High School and Norwood High School. She accepted a job in Perryville, Maryland but had to resign due to a change in her husband's navy orders which led them to Great Lakes, Illinois.

While in Illinois, Mrs. Wood taught and was also principal at the Wadsworth Elementary School. Later, when Wadsworth consolidated with a school in

While in Illinois, Mrs. Wood taught and was also principal at the Wadsworth Elementary School. Later, when Wadsworth consolidated with a school Gurnee, Illinois, she remained in the school system and was head of the English department for approximately eight years.

In 1972 Mrs. Wood returned to her hometown here in Mansfield where she taught high school English until the time of her death. Some of the classes she taught while here are Composition, Practical English, Appreciation of Literature, Business Math, Study Hall, Bookkeeping, Science Fiction, Business English, Creative Writing, Potpourri, General Business, Business Law, Consumer Education, and American Literature.

Not only was Mrs. Wood an active faculty member at school, she was also a member of the Missouri State Teachers Association, American Legion Auxiliary, and a very devoted member of the First Baptist Church.

Although Mrs. Wood can no longer be with us at Mansfield High to teach us and to counsel us in the way she used to, she has left us with many happy memories and a good example of someone dedicated to their work and loved ones.

"The happy moments were when she was visited by former students, and the cards and letters she received from former students (which were many) praising her for her efforts in teaching them. She would remark, 'That letter was worth any effort I ever put forth.'" Mr. Robert Wood. "She refused to give in, to let up, to quit." Mrs. Debbie Arnall.

"Mrs. Wood had a very big influence on my life. She would always have a smile or a kind word for everyone." Debbie Ream. "Her life touched many people." Rev. Dewey R. Hale.

"Mrs. Wood was a very strong-minded person who never gave up easily. She was someone who understood the reasons students did what they did." Mrs. Kathy Barnett.

"She was known for her great sayings such as, Shut up!, Cool it!, All right! and the one she told every new student, 'My name is Mrs. Wood - not Woods. Just one tree - not a whole forest.' She left an impression on each and every one of us. She was a great teacher!" Jeff Dennis
