

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

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

Such activities included an old fashioned sack race, a jail and a real blacksmith from the Spring-


create tools and other items.

FATAL GRASH

With lights flashing and sirens screaming, Mansfield police and volunteer firetighters raced onto West Pennsylvania on March 29, pretending to respond to a single fatality accident. The mock accident, staged by the Mansfield Emergency Academy, the Mansfield Police Department, the volunteer fire department and Saint John's Regional Health Center's Emergency Medical Service, reconstructed the collision of a car, driven by a drunk driver, with a fire engine. The car struck the fire engine's side head on, injuring the driver of the car and some passengers. One passenger in the car and the driver of the fire engine were supposedly killed. While firefighters worked to rescue some passengers, police questioned, and later pretended to arrest, driver Jesse Stuart and passenger Adam Smith. While firefighters were still working, a helicopter from St. John's landed near the parking lot of the First Baptist Church. Flight nurses immediately began caring for victims and preparing them for the flight to Springfield.

"I think it was successful," commented junior Adam Smith. "It was a lot of fun to do." The purpose of the mock accident was to graphically demonstrate to MHS students what the consequences of drinking and driving can be. "Its not a good idea," explained Smith. "If you're going to do it, make the choice not to drive."





up.







In early October, Reeve suffered heart failure from a bedsore infection; soon after, he fell into a coma and died. He left behind a wife, three children and a huge legacy.

OUR BROKEN HOME When students discovered gym classes were being moved outside on April 22, most didn't think anything of it. It wasn't until later that day when everyone learned how serious the issue was.

After noticing the roof was sagging inside the gymnasium, custodian Steven Baty alerted school officials that something was wrong. Outside, he noticed that sheet metal which enclosed wooden beams supporting the gym was bending. On further inspection, the wood underneath was found to be rotting. Deciding it was no longer safe for students to be in the vicinity, Superintendent Arlene Magnin dismissed school early and sent students home.

Although many students were ecstatic to find out school was out for the day, they soon realized that the gym where they'd witnessed

several basketball games, pep rallies and performances might not survive.





The junior varsity lived up to the varsity's success, earning a respectable 16-3 record and claiming the Norwood Tournament championship.







The rainy and unpredictable spring season presented a different kind of challenge.


"We had a lot of games rained out this spring that we couldn't reschedule," said Summer Bannister. "At one point we went more than a week without playing a game."







fter a 9-2 fall season the Lions held high hopes for a great spring and were not disappointed.







"I enjoy playing basketball with my friends," said forward Cody Clayton. "Scoring 18 points in the Hartville tournament was fun too."







"We only won two games, but we have a lot of experience as a team and we know what areas we need to improve," said Chauncie Mitchell, point guard.


The team maintains a positive outlook, citing the season as a learning experience.





eaching children about daily farm life, helping out the Community Blood Center and creating good impressions are just a few areas that active agriculture and FFA members participate in during service projects.










"I love JI,"






