Late in the 2004-2005 school year, the Mansfield School campus was evacuated after custodians discovered that the gym roof was slowly giving way. Students and faculty didn't learn until later that the gym could not be repaired and would have to be torn down

Many other groups - such as the boys and girls basketball teams, FCCLA and FBLA - participated in the effort.

"The day of the voting I went to the polls and asked voters their opinion of Proposition M and also what benefits it would create for the school," said senior Julie Hutton, a member of both FCCLA and FBLA.

The efforts of students and faculty paid off. Proposition M, passed by a narrow margin of 57 votes: 639 to 528.

### Mock Accident

The carnage was horrific when the Mansfield Emergency Academy and Students Against Destructive Decisions staged a mock accident on April 19. The scene was also staged by the Mansfield Police Department, the volunteer fire department and Saint John's Regional Health Center's Emergency Medical Service. Two previously wrecked cars were arranged in the street in front of the school and filled with volunteer victims, covered with makeup to resemble injuries. A passenger in one of the cars portrayed a crash fatality. While firefighters worked to rescue some passengers, police questioned, and later pretended to arrest, the driver. While firefighters were still working, a helicopter from St. John's landed nearby. Flight nurses immediately began caring for victims and preparing them for the flight to Springfield.







"I thought it was a good experience where we got to work with new people as a team," said junior Paige Hoover.


All the activities the students participated in where meant to teach them leadership skills that they could take back to their home schools.






Basketball players, Homecoming queen candidates and princesses were nervous before the ceremonies.





#### Mine Explosions

Following a freak lightning strike, the Tallmansville, West Virginia, Sago coal mine experienced an explosion that trapped 13 mine workers two miles into the mine. Twelve of the miners died before they could be rescued.

Family members were initially misinformed by the mining company that 12 miners had survived and only one was dead. In reality, only one miner survived, Randal McCloy.

The miners, trapped inside a shaft, modified their oxygen masks to extend their usefulness and shared masks as their oxygen supply ran out. The disaster prompted revision of federal mine safety rules.



#### Hurricanes Ravage Southern US Coast

Orphans, broken lives, and lost memories, these are all the effects left behind by the disastrous 2005 hurricane season.

Hurricanes Katrina, Rita and Wilma were the three major storms that slammed into the US's southern coasts

Together these three storms, that affected Florida, Texas, Mississippi and Louisiana, caused billions of dollars in property loss.

According to MSNBC over 1,500 people were killed in these three storms. Hurricane Katrina caused the most deaths. It slammed into Louisiana on August 29.

As Katrina made landfall, hundreds of thousands of refugees fled, some even settling here in the Ozarks.

Not only did these three hurricanes cause major property loss and death along the coast, they damaged or destroyed critical infrastructure many miles away. Katrina shut down oil refineries all over the south, sending gas prices well over \$3.00 as a national average.

These three storms also revealed that the nation's relief system was not ready for such disasters. The director of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, Michael Brown, quit in the aftermath of the disaster.



"The season went excellent considering we didn't have a gym," said Landon Jarrett, freshman guard. The 2005-2006 high school boys basketball season did go well. The varsity team went undefeated in the Summit Conference with a record of 6-0.

This season was different from others because of the lack of a gym. Construction of a new gym began in November and is scheduled for completion before next year's basketball season begins. For the first time in MHS's basketball history, there were no home games, and practices were held in the Mansfield Community Center.

"Practicing at the Community Center [was the hardest part of practice]. The atmosphere and level of enthusiasm was very poor. It didn't seem like a gym. Therefore, the practices seemed very long and boring," said Blake Miller, senior guard. More enthusiasm for practice could have helped against tough opponents.

"The toughest opponents were Mountain Grove and Thayer, because we've never beaten either one of them through my whole high school career. If I had to pick, it would be Thayer because of the tough defense they played," said Kendall Findley, senior guard. There were two close losses to Thayer, but the team managed to defeat Hartville three times this season.

Tough games were an issue during the season too. Consequently, there were a few injuries. Junior Danny Thompson dislocated his knee at Ava on December 20, and senior Billy Newton sprained his foot in the final round of districts on March 4 against Thayer. During the Blue and Gold Tournament at Nixa, sophomore Quentin Berry passed out and was sent to the emergency room. Despite the hardships, though, the boys still achieved a 22-5 overall record.

"We had a great season," said Coach Terry Writer, "Record of 22-5, undefeated Conference Champs, all this was accomplished by a great group of young men who had to practice without the benefit of a gym. I am very proud of them and how they overcame adversity and reached some of their team goals."



After a 10–0 fall season, the Lions rally cry for spring, "You Ain't Seen Nothin' Yet," seemed a tall task. But the Lions, after losing the first game of the spring, reeled off 18 consecutive victories. The boys won the Summit conference 6–0, extending the graduating seniors' conference record to 24–0. "I'm just ready for a change," explained Wood.


# "I'm so glad Coach Wood stayed until we [seniors] left," said Megan Sowers about Coach Wood retiring at the end of the year.






















Senior Adam Kelth tries to Identify metals by the color produced in their flames. He found that the color magenta meant that the metal was nitrate based.































