







When it comes to making the transition from one atmosphere to another, the middle school basketball team adjusted well and improved from the previous year.










In their Spanish and French classes, students learned how to communicate with people from other countries.




Art is the one class in which you are allowed to express yourself without limitations. You can use clay, paint, pencil, oil and many other materials.


Art classes create for grades, pleasure and contests. This year, Mansfield had many entries in the Annual Art Show. The entries ranged from ceramics to sculpture.

Barnwarming includes games such as the hay toss and tug-of-war. Also, a chapter Barnwarming is held in Springfield where members can mingle with students from other schools.

“The tug-of-war,” said sophomore Chad Kabage, is the best part.

Besides playing games, FFA has been doing basketball concession stands throughout the year as well as popcorn stands. Even students who are not FFA members believe that the club is a good influence.

“They’re nice people,” said sophomore Colton Jones about FFA members, “and help you with anything you need help with.”




"It's a good learning experience; they get to meet kids from other schools," said Appleby about taking business students to contests.

To FBLA members, though, the candy canes mean more than just cane shaped pieces of sugar.




SADD members were indeed successful and contributed to a decrease in office referrals.


